"Terrapin Station"

"So many songs, so many lyrics, so many words I love. I wanted to find the Dead lyrics that connected to my career—and that means Terrapin. I really use the peak of 'Terrapin Station' as a mantra. 'Inspiration, move me brightly' means so many things to me usually based on the situation I'm in. I'm a consultant and part of my role is to innovate new ways of thinking about a problem and new solutions. If I am not moving brightly into new areas then I have a hard time being successful. When I face a tough situation with a mentee or team member, I will often ask for 'inspiration' on how to deal with it or to give me patience to listen and respond with kindness. It's an idea and ethos that has served me well—move brightly (happily with joy and a smile) but do so while pushing for a new thought or new approach. Sometimes the mantra is a plea for calmness during a challenging day, other times it is a mantra to keep pushing to find the new insight or idea, but it always helps funnel nervous energy to something valuable. Sure sounds like the Dead to me!"
